

Terms & Condition

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International trade is related to import & export of goods & service. Export orders must conform to the contract between buyer and & seller & in most case. The contract is sent from the foreign buyer. Before the confirmation of a contract, it must be scrutinized with the parcel details & their specification, terms of payment, delivery schedule.

The immediate task of an exporter is to acknowledge the export order which is different from its acceptance. The shipper should proceed to examine the export order carefully concerning the item, product specification, pre-shipment inspection, payment conditions, special packaging, labeling & marking requirement as well as shipment & delivery date, marine insurance, documentation. If the exporter is satisfied with these aspects, a formal confirmation of the export order is sent form the buyer end & exporter should proceed to enter into a formal contract with the overseas buyer.

As an Express courier company Export & Import parcel at first, collect some documents which will widely use in executing Export/Import order.

They are:

SBC Express clearance procedures:

All shipments crossing international borders must be cleared through Customs in the destination country prior to being delivered to the recipient. Unless the sender specified a broker, SBC Express submits shipments to Customs and other regulatory agencies. It is the sender's responsibility to provide the necessary and correct documentation. Shipments that require more than the SBC Express Air Waybill and Commercial Invoice may require more transit time. If shipments are held by Customs because of incorrect or missing documentation we may first attempt to notify the recipient.

When shipping to Bangladesh, clearance through Customs depends on whether you're shipping:

- Documents with no commercial value
- Dutiable goods
- The shipper, the recipient, or a third party may pay duty and/or tax.
- Partial clearance of shipments is not allowed.
- Duty and taxes will be assessed on all shipments, including gift items. Duty exempt imports
 include shipments from governments, semi-government organizations, embassies, etc. All
 duty exempt shipments must include the applicable duty exemption letters.
- Customs reserves the right to declare any shipment to be undervalued. Any shipment thought to be undervalued will be reassessed for the actual value and clearance will be delayed.
- If a shipment has not received clearance within 30 days from arrival, the shipment will be considered abandoned and surrendered to Customs. No claims will be accepted after 30 days.
- Clearance must occur at Dhaka Airport. Shipments may not be transferred to another airport within Bangladesh until clearance has been received from Dhaka.

Import/Export Prohibitions and Restrictions:

Certain items are prohibited by Customs for import/Export to Bangladesh. These items are in addition to items forbidden by IATA. Senders are responsible for making sure that the goods they are shipping are acceptable for shipment to Bangladesh.

- Currencies
- Medicines
- Any Powder Items
- Liquid
- Chemicals
- Battery
- Electronic Items (Mobile phones, Laptop, Headphones, Starters, Radio, Battery Machine, toys, Gadgets with batteries, Wireless or with wires etc).
- Dangerous goods as defined by IATA
- Viagra
- Pornographic materials
- Arms and explosives
- Leather (wet blue)
- Ice (wet)
- Jewelry containing precious metals
- Metals, precious
- Human body parts

- Live animals
- Personal effects

Restrictions for Import to Bangladesh:

- Medicine requires a No Objection Certificate (NOC) from Drug Administration.
- Food, perishable and non-perishable, requires a Radiation Certificate from the Bangladesh Atomic Energy Commission (BAEC) to be submitted by consignee to Customs for clearance
- Wireless telephones, Networking Device (electronic and remote control) require a Certificate from the Bangladesh Telecommunication Regulatory Commission (BTRC).

Required Documentation

- If you are shipping documents, an Air Waybill and SBC Express Waybill are required.
- If you are sending a gift shipment, an Air Waybill, Commercial Invoice and authorization of the consignee are required.
- If you are shipping samples, an Air Waybill, an SBC Express Waybill, a Commercial Invoice, and a copy of VAT registration are required.
- If you are shipping a high value shipment, an Air Waybill, SBC Express Waybill, a VAT Registration Certificate, an Import Registration Certificate, an Import Permit, and authorization from the consignee are required.
